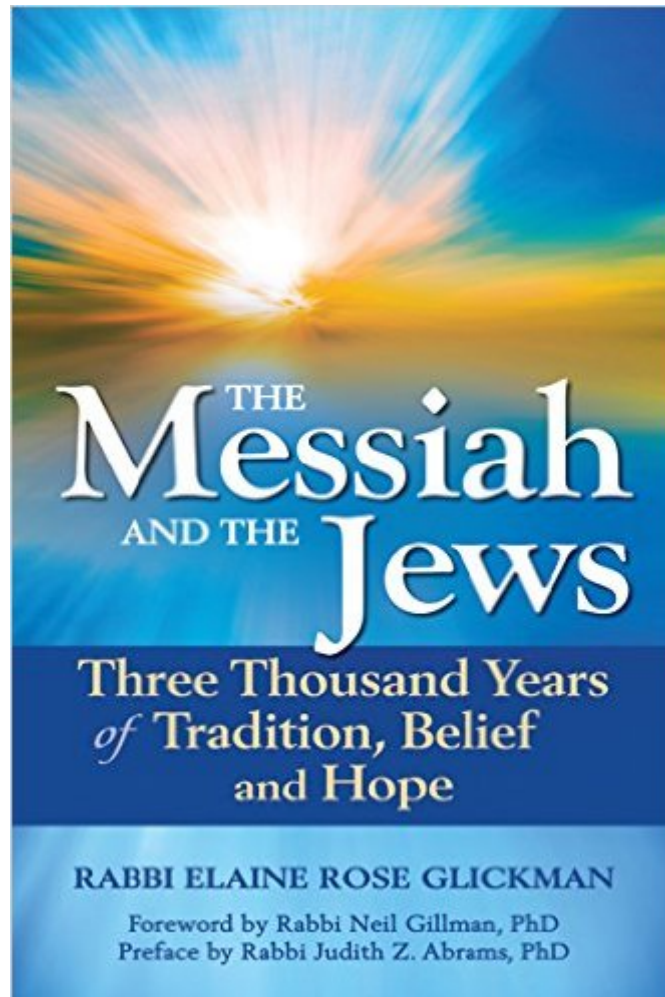

Rabbi Glickman has managed to pen a remarkable treatise regarding a subject that is central to two great religions. And she has done so in an articulate yet readable style that captures the many conditions in which Jews have described their expectations of the Messiah for three millennia.

Expectations are framed both in terms of the "wait" so central to Judaism and the anticipated results of Messianic activities. Jewish readers will also find a magnificent spiritual journey into the realm of the highest expectations of their people. Though written primarily for a Jewish audience, the book includes material that will enthrall Christians seeking to understand their heritage and the ways in which the New Testament writers interpreted the expectations of the Messiah culminating in Jesus of Nazareth. This book goes beyond the simple explanations so often taught and moves to a detailed explanation of what Christians hold dear in their teaching. All will find commonality in the central assertion with which Rabbi Glickman begins this wonderful book--that expectations of the Messiah mean simply that things will get better than this. Both Jews and Christians will identify with this simple, yet salient insight. This is a wonderful book. A thorough but quick read to be revisited time and again to delve into both history and the spiritual journey made possible by its exploration.

After explaining the history of Jewish ideas about the Messiah, Rabbi Glickman finds a way to think about the Messiah today and use belief to forge an optimistic faith in the future. It is not easy to explain eschatology in clear language, but the author succeeds.
